At its meeting on 16 September 2014, the Conference of Committee Chairs discussed the organisation of the hearings of the Commissioners-designate.

The CCC endorsed the **draft written questionnaire**, which I am pleased to attach (annex I) and agreed on the **draft programme of the hearings** (annex II).

Following a thorough examination of each case, the Chairs adopted a table proposing the modalities of cooperation between committees (annex III).

Based on the decision taken last week by the Conference of Presidents on the responsible committees, the second column of this table indicates the <u>associated committees</u>, which should be given a share of the question time in the hearing.

As foreseen by Annex XVI, their opinion shall be mentioned in the evaluation letter.

The third column suggests for some committees to be <u>invited</u> by the responsible committee(s). This informal involvement aims at allowing the necessary flexibility and ensuring that all aspects of the portfolios are duly considered while avoiding excessive complexity of the structure of the hearings.

It was generally agreed that these committees will be given the possibility to ask at least one question.

It should be noted that, given the wide nature of the portfolio of the Vice-president for Jobs, Growth, Investment and Competitiveness, and the interest of many committees to be involved in this hearing, the relevant Chairs agreed upon informal ways of cooperation allowing the committees interested to participate.

I would be grateful if you could submit these proposals to the Conference of Presidents for their endorsement.

3. The alarming situation of payments in the EU budget

During the last years we have seen a tendency in the Council to challenge Commission's payments forecasts which constitute the basis for Commission's proposals, to cut payment appropriations in its readings of the annual draft budgets and to reduce the level of payments proposed by the Commission through amending budgets. This resulted into a snowball effect leading to a huge backlog of unpaid bills and to an alarming growth in the level of the RALs, in clear contradiction to the Council statements and the European Council conclusions.

Which future steps do you envisage to convince the budgetary authority of the reliability of Commission's figures, which constitute the undisputable basis for the level of the payments appropriations proposed?

In this context the Parliament and the Commission have consistently defended the application of maximum possible flexibility in the implementation of the MFF. This has resulted in a number of new provisions in the MFF Regulation, some of which nevertheless appear to leave some margins of interpretation. In particular, payments on the special instruments are for both the Commission and the Parliament to be counted over and above the MFF payment ceilings. There is however no indication from Council that it would accept such interpretation, rather the contrary. This results in a ludicrous situation where both arms of the budget authority take budgetary decisions considering different margins in payments at their disposal.

What is your assessment of this situation and what concrete steps do you envisage to convince the Council and avoid any blockage in the future?

4. Post-electoral revision of the MFF and reform of the system of own resources

Parliament continuously defended the principle of a post-electoral revision of the 2014-2020 MFF, which is now enshrined in article 2 of the MFF Regulation and in a number of Commission's statements, the last one being the unilateral declaration of December 2013. In his speech to the European Parliament on 15 July, President-elect Juncker pointed out that this mid-term review "should be used to orient the EU budget further towards jobs, growth and competitiveness".

With reference to the above, could you provide details as to the expected timing of the presentation of Commission's legislative proposal for the revision of the MFF regulation, as well as on whether and how do you envisage engaging in a genuine and deep political dialogue with Parliament on its contents?

As to the possible contents of the revision, do you believe it would need to address the continuation and proper funding of frontloaded programmes, such as the Youth Employment Initiative, emerging priorities such as, most recently, the EU-wide investment plans agreed by the June 2014 European Council or the Ukrainian crisis, the increasing level of RALs and the persisting problem of payments?

The European Parliament attaches a great important to the reform of the own resources of the EU budget. Which follow-up do you intend to ensure to the proposals put forward by the former Commission? In particular, how do you plan to use the post-electoral revision of the MFF as an occasion to examine and propose new own resources? The European Parliament has expressed concerns with the Agreement as it stands, especially with regards to the shortcomings of the political dialogue on human rights.

How does the Commissioner-designate intend to involve him/herself in the Strategic Dialogue with the European Parliament on DCI? Can you confirm that the Commission will adopt amending delegated acts on the DCI annexes containing the areas of cooperation and indicative financial allocations after the mid-term review, as provided for in the DCI regulation (art. 17)?

At the same time, the EU is driving for more complementarity, coherence and consistency between EU external policies, and there is an increased focus on strengthening EU crisis management via the recently set-up 'EU comprehensive approach'.

How will you make sure that EU Humanitarian Aid policy remains needs-based and in keeping with the humanitarian principles of humanity, neutrality, impartiality and independence, and not become instrumentalised for foreign policy objectives? What does the Commissioner-designate intend to do to address these challenges in preparation of the first-ever World Humanitarian Summit in Istanbul, Turkey, in May 2016?

4. Conflict and the protection of civilians:

Most contemporary armed conflicts involve one or more armed non-state actors fighting governments or other armed groups, with civilians and in particular children bearing the brunt of these wars. What does the Commissioner-designate intend to do to ensure that states and armed non-state actors comply with international humanitarian law and take special measures to protect civilians, in particular children?

5. EU Financing of Humanitarian Aid

The recent or on-going conflicts in Syria and Gaza have turned into the world's largest humanitarian and security disaster. Not to mention the unstable security situation in the DRC, CAR and Sudan. Haiti and the Philippines are still recovering from unprecedented natural disasters. Humanitarian needs continue to increase. Recent EU humanitarian funding shortfalls are having a strong impact on crisis-affected populations.

How do you intend to ensure that there are sufficient payments for humanitarian aid and that the Commission will return to predictable and timely humanitarian funding in 2015 and throughout your mandate, and maintain a consistent level of humanitarian assistance in line with the Multi-Annual Financial Framework? Furthermore, what will be your approach towards the Emergency Aid Reserve (EAR), which has proven to be an essential instrument to enable response in sudden-onset disasters and conflicts: will you make sure that it stays outside the EC budget and that it is allocated first and foremost for humanitarian operations?

3. Impact assessments, administrative procedure law and subsidiarity

During the last legislature, Parliament focused a much of its work on better regulation in implementing the Lisbon Treaty, which created a new legislative environment. The move towards smart regulation and regulatory fitness is intended to pave the way for a policy cycle based on 1) wider consultations, including multidisciplinary impact assessments at several levels and subsidiarity checks by national parliaments, 2) drafting and enactment of legislation with the possibility of delegating legislative powers or conferring implementing powers on the Commission, and 3) ex-post checks the result of which are to be fed back into new policy cycles in the form of new initiatives, including cutting red tape.

Parliament has in recent years set up internal services tasked with conducting ex-ante and ex-post impact assessments of legislative proposals and amendments and study European added value and the cost of non-Europe. The Commission's impact assessments are made before the College of Commissioners decides on a proposal, and do not take into account any revisions made in the final proposal. Furthermore, the Council has no means of carrying out impact assessments as regards its amendments and positions on legislative proposals.

In its resolution of 15 January 2013, Parliament requested the Commission to submit, on the basis of Article 298 of the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union, a proposal for a regulation on a European Law of Administrative Procedure, following detailed recommendations set out in the resolution concerning inter alia general principles which should govern the administration and rules governing administrative decisions. The Commission has reacted to this request by stating that this question is very important and has committed itself to studying it carefully before taking any further steps.

The Lisbon Treaty sought not only to give wider legislative powers to Parliament, but also to facilitate the implementation, application and enforcement of EU law. In several resolutions, Parliament, invoking the Commission's fundamental role as the 'guardian of the Treaties,' has called on the Commission to use its power and duty to oversee the application of EU law more rigorously, since this is a cornerstone of the Union legal order which must based on the rule of law. How do you stand on this fundamental aspect?

According to Article 5 of the Treaty on European Union, national Parliaments "ensure compliance with the principle of subsidiarity" in accordance with the procedure set out in Protocol 2 of the Lisbon Treaty which introduced a mechanism of subsidiarity scrutiny by national Parliaments on draft EU legislation through the issuing of reasoned opinions.

According to Article 7 of Protocol 2 the author of a legislative proposal "shall take account of the reasoned opinions issued by national Parliaments or a chamber of a national Parliament". The so-called yellow and orange card procedures require the Commission to review a draft proposal and to decide whether to maintain, amend or withdraw it if a certain threshold is attained in terms of the number of reasoned opinions issued within the set time-limit. The threshold for a 'yellow card' by national Parliaments has so far been reached on two occasions. The first time was in May 2012 in respect of the Commission's legislative proposal on the right to strike (Monti II). The Commission withdrew the proposal some months later. In November 2013 the threshold for a yellow card was reached in respect of the proposal to establish a European Public Prosecutor's Office. However, on this occasion the Commission decided to maintain its proposal unchanged.

What concrete steps does the Vice-President-designate intend to take in order to update and to revise the 2003 Interinstitutional Agreement on Better Law-Making – as requested on several occasions by Parliament –, and to build up a European Law of Administrative Procedure in order to take account of these developments and to ensure transparency and legal certainty for citizens? More specifically, what action does he intend to take in order to ensure that the Commission's impact assessments are conducted completely independently and that legislative procedures are evidence-based at all steps? How would the Commissioner-designate react if a proposal from the Commission were to receive a number of reasoned opinions and what action would he take? If the threshold for a yellow or orange card by national Parliaments against a Commission proposal were to be reached, would he consider himself under a duty either to withdraw or revise the proposal? Would the Commissioner-designate consider inviting the European Parliament and its committee responsible to evaluate, together with the Commission, what the correct response to a yellow or orange card should be?

4. Delegated and implementing acts

Articles 290 and 291 of the Treaty of the Functioning of the European Union (TFEU) introduced the possibility of delegating legislative powers or conferring implementing powers on the Commission. The Council has shown itself unwilling to delegate legislative powers in the vast majority of cases where the conditions under Article 290 TFEU are met, and seems to favour the conferral of implementing powers, arguably in order to secure the influence of Member State experts. The Court of Justice has recently ruled, in its judgment in Case C-472/12, that the EU legislature has a discretion when it decides between the two Articles and that judicial review is limited to manifest errors of assessment as to whether the EU legislature could reasonably have taken the view, first, that, in order to be implemented, the legal framework which it laid down in the basic act needs only the addition of further detail, without its non-essential elements having to be amended or supplemented and, secondly, that the provisions of the basic act require uniform conditions for implementation.

Pursuant to point 15 of the Framework Agreement on relations between the European Parliament and the European Commission, the Commission is to provide full information and documentation on its meetings with national experts within the framework of its work on the preparation and implementation of Union legislation, including soft law and delegated acts. If so requested by Parliament, the Commission may also invite Parliament's experts to attend those meetings.

What steps is the Commissioner-designate planning to take in order to ensure that Article 290 TFEU does not become nugatory in the face of the Council's reluctance to delegate legislative powers to the Commission? How does the Commissioner-designate intend to improve the modalities of cooperation with the European Parliament in the field of delegated and implementing acts? How does the Commission plan to make progress on the so-called Omnibus package (alignment) that is currently stalled in the Council, despite the fact that Parliament adopted its first reading position as long ago as February 2014? Will the Commissioner-designate commit himself to setting up a Register for Delegated Acts, access to which would be granted unconditionally to Parliament at all stages of the procedure, and to improving the transmission to Parliament of all the documents pertaining to implementing acts? Does the Commissioner-designate agree that good cooperation in this area also includes full access of Parliament's experts to Commission expert groups preparing delegated acts and to the information available to them?

Ouestions from the Committee on Civil Liberties, Justice and Home Affairs:

What will be your 2 priorities in the area of the rule of law and fundamental rights? Which specific method will you apply to make sure these 2 priorities are delivered?

Are you ready to participate in a <u>question time with the LIBE Committee upon request</u> in order to review these priorities and discuss relevant topical matters?

As the <u>first Commissioner explicitly in charge of the rule of law</u>, what is your strategy to ensure it is effectively and equally respected throughout the European Union? How will you make use of the mechanism put forward by your predecessor and follow up the position expressed by the EP in its resolutions on this matter?

What is your position as to a European Union internal strategy on <u>fundamental rights</u> as requested by Parliament, in order to ensure the effective application of the Charter throughout its territory?

Questions from the Committee on Constitutional Affairs:

7. Institutional challenges - How to bring EU closer to the citizens?

In order to fight against the growing Euroscepticism in many Member States can you clarify the elements that appear to be essential (better functioning of the European Citizens' Initiative, measures to improve the transparency of the EU decision making process and of lobbies activities...) to restore the confidence of citizens in the European project and what commitments you are willing to take in these areas? How, following the conclusions of the Interinstitutional Task Force on MAPs, does the Commissioner-designate intend to proactively facilitate a resolution of the dispute between Parliament and Council through, for example, the tabling of revised or new multiannual plans in the near future? With a view to determining a workable demarcation between Delegated and Implementing Acts, is the Commissioner-designate ready, together with the Council to engage in further negotiations with the EP, in order to find a common understanding on the interpretation, use of, and follow-up to Articles 290 and 291 TFEU? How does the Commissionerdesignate intend to introduce simplification and flexibility into the rules and regulations on Technical Measures? Does the Commissioner-designate intend to propose one common framework, or different frameworks for different sea basins? Will the Commissioner-designate undertake to promote the introduction, of specific EU eco-labelling for fishery products? On which criteria would this European ecolabelling be based and what would be its principal characteristics? Having regard to Article 15 of the Basic Regulation, what measures will the Commissioner-designate propose in the Mediterranean to prevent the emergence of a parallel market for juvenile fish? How does the Commissioner-designate intend to improve, in the context of FPAs, the coordination of the EU's fisheries, trade and development policies? In relation to the financial contribution that is paid for almost all FPAs, has the Commissioner-designate the intention of proposing a new format for the part set aside for the development of these countries? What will be the strategy of the Commissioner-designate in the case of countries (especially those in the Central-Western Pacific) with which the EU has signed trade agreements, but which are currently on the list of non-cooperating countries in the fight against IUU fishing? Could the Commissioner-designate explain why the fishing opportunities relative to joint stocks and other management aspects are decided through yearly negotiations and set out in agreed records which are not subject to the Consent Procedure?
